Functional assessment of activities and participations according to the International

Classification of Functioning, Disability and Health in patients with central hemiparesis

Abstract:

Functional independence and social integration, which are the domains of occupational therapy,

are essential for the successful rehabilitation of patients. The International Classification

of Functioning, Disability and Health can provide a suitable framework for functional

assessment, not only for occupational therapists.

The main aim of this thesis is a determination of the functional picture of selected patients with

central hemiparesis. The secondary objectives encompass firstly a verification of pre-

established hypotheses, and secondly, an evaluation of the influence of the Day Hospital of the

General University Hospital in Prague on the functional abilities of patients with central

hemiparesis. Primary research methods comprise in particular a quantitative data analysis and

comparison; however, a qualitative analysis of texts or description are also utilized.

The research retrospectively evaluates the results of the assessment of activities

and participation and environmental factors in patients with central hemiparesis who attended

the Day Hospital of the General University Hospital in Prague. The results suggest that patients

with central hemiparesis have mild or no difficulties in most of the activity and participation

domains assessed. The degree of difficulty in performing each domain is then dependent

on environmental factors.
