Evaluation

Major criteria:

The presented dissertation deals with the negative effects of the commodification of externalities in the area of waste management. More specifically, the author intends to investigate the processes around the management of e-waste. This is a laudable idea, as it is a growing industry with non-negligible environmental implications. The theoretical framework is very eclectic. The author offers a rather disorganized overview of theoretical approaches defining the problem of externalities. Only in the last paragraphs, the author approaches literature that seems suitable for criticizing the neoliberal solution in this area - critical environmental economics and green Marxism.

The dissertation engages some relevant literature but does so in a confusing way. Any discussion on methodology is, unfortunately, missing. That said, the paper would benefit from a stronger research design that would streamline the theoretical discussion and led to the development of conceptual framework that would inform the empirical analysis.

However, taking into account the shortcoming mentioned above, the dissertation interestingly maps out the environment around the e-waste management. Additionally, the empirical parts are easier to follow and often reads analytical. It also offers some suggestions that appear to be grounded much in empirical investigation than disciplinary concepts.

Minor criteria:

The paper would benefit from a more careful editing. It often suffers at the interface with the discipline.
