Reviewer 1

This is a solid dissertation, which competently tackles an intriguing issue through an adequate methodological approach and showcasing some interesting research work. I thought that the draft indulged too much on some ultimately redundant background information: chapter 1-2 could have fused into one, more-to-the-point literature review, freeing some space for a more precise, and indeed necessary, segment locating why focus on the United Kingdom helped addressing the overarching question of this thesis. What is missing, in my views, is a connecting argument that firmly anchored the issues to be treated here to the UK scenario, highligting how the formulation and the ensuing implementation of specific counter-terrorist policies tackled ISIS propaganda targeting women. It seemed that with better and more focused planning, this dissertation could have done more justice to the great research work showcased here. **Reviewer 2**

The reviewed thesis is a fairly original piece of research dealing with a timely topic. It's thereotically driven, methodologically rigorous. The thesis is centered on a workable objective; it works with a narrowly identified research problem; draws on a solid corpus of literature. Analytical and well-written, the thesis offers a fascinating journey into the world of ISIS media engaged in luring Western women into the trap of a military jihadist organization. Apart from presenting a vaste amount of data, the thesis makes clear general arguments as it successfully evaluates the ISIS propaganda via the researched lens. The work is generally well-researched; well-structured; and enhances our understanding of a key phenomenon of security studies. I suggest the author considers publishing their work in the form of a scholarly article.
