Short summary

In her bachelor thesis, Daniela Javůrková investigates whether host country language proficiency improves the employability of refugees. To tackle this research question, Daniela designed and executed a correspondence experiment. She identified nearly 500 job offers on Czech on-line job portals (www.jobs.cz and www.prace.cz) and sent nearly 1000 experimental CVs in response, two per job offer. Three types of CVs were used: a native Czech woman, a Ukrainian refugee with only a basic command of Czech, and a Ukrainian refugee with a very good command of Czech. Analysis of callback rates (here: invitations for a job interview) of these three groups reveals that Ukrainian women have a significantly lower chance of being invited to an interview. On the other hand, only a tiny and often not statistically significant difference was observed between the two types of Ukrainian refugees. If anything, Daniela observes a higher callback rate among refugees with only a basic knowledge of the Czech language. The author runs several robustness checks and suggests explanations for this slightly confusing result. Given that controlling for job offer fixed effect always leads to insignificant differences between the two types of Ukrainian job candidates, the most appealing interpretation is that employers do not pay attention to, do not believe in, or simply ignore signals about language proficiency and treat all Ukrainian candidates the same.

Contribution

The presented bachelor thesis greatly contributes to our understanding of the situation of Ukrainian refugees (and refugees in general) in the Czech labor market. It also adds an important voice to the growing international literature about refugees' and immigrants' language skills. I think that this thesis can be quite well published as a research paper.

Methods

Daniela uses a controlled experiment to answer the research question. She was very careful with designing the experiment and paid detailed attention to designing the CVs of fictitious job candidates and randomizing the process of responding to job offers. The experiment was run long enough so that a sufficient number of observations was collected. The resulting dataset was then thoroughly examined using both statistical and econometric analysis. I have to stress that Daniela was not satisfied with the first result she obtained and insisted on trying several estimation methods and several specifications to ensure robustness. Thus, the main analysis consists of five linear probability model specifications (two with job offer fixed effects) and four logit/probit specifications (two with job offer fixed effects). This is complemented with several sensitivity checks on different subsamples (e.g. only Prague, only specific types of job offers, only job offers where two Ukrainian CVs were sent, etc.). Daniela very carefully compares the results of all these specifications and formulates her final conclusions based on the combined results inspired by earlier literature. All this makes the presented analysis very mature.

Literature

The whole thesis is very well organized and written in very good English. Sometimes, the thesis may be written in a bit too poetic language, but this does not interrupt comprehension.

Overall evaluation and suggested questions for the discussion during the defense

This is an excellent bachelor thesis. From the beginning, Daniela decided not to take any shortcuts and carefully worked towards answering the research question that interested her. She was well-organized when running the experiment, and actively but critically followed my data analysis suggestions. The resulting work highly outperforms the standards for a bachelor thesis at IES. I am convinced that after slight formatting it can be published in an impacted journal.

The thesis by Daniela Javůrková fulfills the requirements for a bachelor thesis at IES, Faculty of Social Sciences, Charles University. Actually, it also fulfills the requirements for a master's thesis. I recommend the thesis for the defense and suggest a grade A. Additionally, I suggest that the thesis be considered for an outstanding thesis award.

The results of the Turnitin analysis do not indicate significant text similarity with other available sources.
