Nino Melkadze: Role of Dissidents in 1986-1991 Georgia

Thesis assessment

Nino Melkadze's thesis is historical and sociological in nature. Its content is

oriented towards the question of how the dissident movement influenced the social

processes, societal changes and struggle for independence which took place in Georgia

between 1968 and 1991. The thesis has a theoretical-research character. The research

section is based on the analysis of available historical sources and focuses on an

examination of the strategies and practices that characterized Georgian dissidents in this

period.

As far as my evaluation is concerned, it must be stated that I did not get to

supervise the thesis written by Nino Melkadze until the last weeks before the author

completed and submitted her work. Since the collaboration between the student and the

previous supervising teacher was at an impasse during this time, I tried to motivate the

author of the thesis to above all bring the work - in the time she had left - to some

satisfactory conclusion. This was, in my view, largely successful.

Although during the writing of her thesis Nino Melkadze was unable to work on

the text of her thesis in the libraries and archives in Georgia, she managed (in my

opinion) to produce a text that satisfactorily covers her research intention. Despite the

somewhat hectic completion of the text of this thesis, the author has managed to finalize

a piece of work that adequately fulfils the qualifying parameters set for papers of this

type. The thesis demonstrates, in a fairly representative manner, the knowledge and

skills which the author has acquired during her studies on the Historical Sociology

program.

Depending on how Nino Melkadze is able to present and defend her work, in my

opinion it could be assessed as good or even very good.
