

**Abstract:**

The bachelor's thesis addresses the topic of online supervision from the perspective of selected social workers. The work is divided into two parts, theoretical and practical. The theoretical part defines supervision, its types, functions, and supervisory parties. It then focuses on supervision in social work, including its legal definition, significance, and describes various supervisory techniques. Furthermore, the theoretical section explores types of online communication and their use in social work, the final chapter details the specific aspects of supervisory contact in an online environment, with a focus on social work. The aim of the practical part is to understand the perception of online supervision from the perspective of social workers who have experienced it, to compare the benefits and limitations of online contact, and to contrast online supervision with face-to-face supervision. The research employs a qualitative method using semi-structured interviews with six social workers who have experience with either group or individual online supervision.
