

The first chapter of presented theses discusses the state of research. It maps the individual currents of thinking of these literary elements and introduces them to their supporters.

The text continues with a list of historical and social contexts. The apostle directed his words to church communities that were part of a certain reality. Christians lived and shared with people of different roots, diverse mindsets, in cities with often a very opulent history. The following paragraphs discuss Paul's Correspondence containing catalogs of peristasis. General details are written here, such as the date, place of writing and content of the Letters, their breakdown; about uniformity or non-uniformity, or about other peculiarities.

Each presentation of the lead is followed by a presentation of the given catalog of peristasis with its – for now only brief – basic characteristics. Considering that I have already worked on part of the issue in my master thesis, I have attached the text to these theses for completeness and beyond the required number of pages of the dissertation thesis. These are mainly analyzes of relevant passages containing catalogs of peristasis in the Second Epistle to Corinth and some paragraphs concerning the Corinthian community.

The fourth chapter of the presented these sis devoted to the Old Testament view of pain and Suffering, followed by a chapter summarizing the content of the theses and conclusion specifying further intentions in the process of completing the dissertation.
