Evaluation Martin Juhas

Martin Juhas has done his master thesis studies as an Erasmus student in my laboratory at the Department of Medical Biochemistry and Cell Biology, Sahlgrenska Academy, University of Gothenburg during the autumn 2017. The University of Gothenburg has approximately 37,000 students and 5,900 employees. It is one of the major universities in northern Europe. We are also one of the most popular universities in Sweden – the University of Gothenburg has the highest number of applicants to many programs and courses. In an international perspective too, the University of Gothenburg is unusually comprehensive, with cutting-edge research in a number of dynamic research areas. Cooperation with Chalmers University of Technology, Sahlgrenska University Hospital, society at large, trade and industry has been consistently strengthened and intensified over recent years, as have international contacts and collaborative projects with partners abroad.

Martin Juhas master thesis focuses on the carbohydrate regognition of the novel enterotoxin LT-IIc. During his time in my lab he has performed a multitude of methods, including column chromatographies, thin-layer chromatography, solid-phase binding studies, electrophoresis and Western blot, and also participated in structural characterization of glycolipids by mass spectrometry. Martin Juhas has an excellent background knowledge of biochemistry, and he is competent, ambitious and thorough. He quickly learned the methods and background of the project, which is very good given the fact that glycobiology is a complex research area. Martin Juhas is kind, generous and helpful, and interacts well with other people. Taken together, Martin Juhas is an excellent student and I would gladly recommend him for a Ph.D. position.
